A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR



Grace and peace to all our Salem community!

If you can believe it, it's almost time for Lent. Lent will start on Valentine's Day, February 14th this year. At first glance, this feels like a strange overlap. A day of pink and red glitter hearts accompanying heartfelt declarations of love doesn't seem to match with the burnt Palm branches that become the ashes we adorn our foreheads with every year on Ash Wednesday.

And yet. The more we know about Ash Wednesday, the more it starts to make poetic sense.

Ash Wednesday is the day that begins the 40-day season of Lent that leads up to Easter. (Of course, it's 40-days of "church math"... we leave out the Sundays!). During this season we often abstain from something decadent in order to both understand Christ's fasting in the wilderness and to better celebrate Christ's resurrection on Easter.

The Eastern Orthodox Church does this better than anyone else. They abstain from a number of things, including anything with eggs in it! Can you imagine thinking through what you eat in a day and removing all the eggs? Obviously cakes and cookies and scrambled eggs, but also most meatloaf recipes, some lasagna, and many storebought snacks. It forces them to think about their faith all day, every day for the 40 days. Then, on Easter vigil (which is a different day for them) they each get a hard-boiled egg. In seminary, a friend of mine was just converting to the Eastern Orthodox faith, and he said it was the *best* egg he had ever eaten in his life. They celebrated the resurrection by reintroducing their taste buds to something they loved with a new appreciation for its deliciousness. On our own, we can't comprehend the glory of the resurrection—it's too abstract. But for them, it's even more wonderful than eating that egg. What a way to personalize it! What a way to understand the love.

You see, it's about understanding God's sacrifice. But it's also about understanding God's love. Ash Wednesday kicks off a hard time in the church year, but it's also a time filled with love. Our communion liturgy says, "God died for us while we were yet sinners, that *proves* God's love for us." Lent prepares us for Christ's loving sacrifice. We don't practice Lent to feel guilty or to suffer. We do it to see how deep God's love is.

So, on Valentine's Day, join us for Ash Wednesday. Celebrate and recognize the love of Christ.

OBITUARY FOR REV. LIL GEIB

Rev. Lillian Hughes Rodgers Geib, 77, born on July 26, 1946, passed away on January 23, 2024 in Winston-Salem, North Carolina. She had lived in Spencer, Virginia.





A native Washingtonian, she received degrees in biological sciences from Virginia Intermont College, and in sociology and criminology from the University of MD. Following her graduation in 1971, she served in Volunteers in Service to America, was Director of the Central Virginia Community Health Center, and was Director of the Charles County Children's Aid Society. She co-founded the Charles County Community Crisis and Referral Center and the Charles County Children's Abuse Task Force.

Rev. Lil earned her Masters of Divinity from Wellesley Theological Seminary in 1997. She was an ordained elder of the UMC who served many churches in Virginia and Maryland even in her retirement. She served at Salem from August 2001 to June 2008. You may remember seeing Rev. Lil at Salem a couple of times in the last few years. One Sunday in 2023 she performed the prayer shawl blessing.

OBITUARY FOR REV. JEANNE KLAUDA

Rev. Jeanne Williamson Klauda, 78, born on February 26, 1945, passed away on January 23, 2024 at her home in Annapolis, Maryland.

Rev. Klauda was a member of St. Paul's UMC in Kensington from 1951 to 1968. She graduated from Frostburg State Univ., served in the Peace Corps, and then attended Wesley Seminary. She was ordained in 1968, but as the Conference did not allow women pastors at that time, she served as Director of Christian Education in several churches until

1976, when she received her first pastoral assignment. She was pastor at Salem from 1981 to 1985 and served at three churches after that including North Bethesda UMC, Severna Park UMC, and Providence-Fort Washington UMC. She retired in 2006 as a Retired Elder.

LEADERSHIP TEAM UPDATE

January's Leadership Team meeting started the look ahead for this year. The team discussed assigning "must start by" dates on the 2024 calendar for church activities such as the annual stewardship drive and pastor evaluation. The same for retreats, charge conference and BWC conference. Staying on task per the current schedule is going to be a focus for the team.

The team continues to consult with an architect/contractor for improving several aspects of the sanctuary. We had an on-site meeting with a firm and are expecting preliminary remodeling renderings to review and revise as needed. Roofing, lighting, carpeting, painting and overhead projection are a few of the modifications the team would

like to put forward to the congregation at some point this year.

Further discussion was held on cemetery plot and cremains burial prices. The team felt the current prices suggested could still be adjusted up. The team needs all members in place to finalize that decision.

The snow removal contract came up for discussion, and the current services offered will handle plowing situations. Notifying the contractor to be out there most likely needs a point person at Salem. Snow removal must sync with Sunday services so everyone can park and walk safely.

Generally, spending and revenue are in balance starting this year with a healthy surplus of funds on hand.

We are interviewing candidates for child care during Sunday services. We hope that offering this care will help encourage new parishioners with children to come to Salem.

Finally, the team wishes to thank Nancy Cox and Fred Ambrose for coordinating much needed plumbing repairs in the Community Hall building.
