Happy March, my siblings in Christ!

By this point, we are a few weeks into Lent. On February 14th we had a holy Ash Wednesday service with the South Damascus Charge and St. Paul UMC, Laytonsville. Rev. Will Newton preached. It was my favorite of his sermons thus far! If you haven't seen it, check it out on our YouTube channel or Facebook page. He had everyone take a Palm branch (as if it was Palm Sunday!) and imagine inscribing everything that we needlessly carry onto it. When we came forward to receive our ashes, we reverently (or with a good spirit of "good riddance!") passed it off to remember that we are only mortal and need God to sustain us.

From dust you have come, and to dust you will return.

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I have been a little bit obsessed with our dusty identity. As we enter this Season of Belovedness, we go back to our origin stories in Genesis to see the way that God began human life and relationships. It all begins with dust and love. Sometimes, it means sitting down with a book that just gives you pause and you find yourself breathing deeper. Maybe it's time with a friend who really understands you. Here are some things that are helping me breathe deeper right now:

- Reading "Wholehearted Faith" by Rachel Held Evans (and Jeff Chu). She is sharing her legacy of faith through the women who have taught her, loved her, and come before her. Her writing is gorgeous and gentle and gives me hope.
- Listening to "The Bible Binge" podcast. They have a great tongue-in-cheek way of thinking about reverent topics. It feels like listening to my seminary friends talking about faith.
- Walking through the woods behind the church cemetery with my dogs. Winkie and I have been playing a game where he runs around and then comes back and gets a treat. It's so nice to be able to communicate and play with him

without drama! We love the peace in the woods (as long as we stay out of pricker bushes!)

 Our Bible Study, Introducing the Old Testament. Even though I have a fancy theological degree I am learning so much from this study. It helps me breathe to know that I don't have to know everything and that there are still things to learn.

NEWS FROM KYLE MAUZY, INTERN

Rev. Emily and I attended the **Maryland Legislative Advocacy Day** in Annapolis on Feb. 21. For those unable to join us, we focused on three different bills that different groups have shown to senators and delegates. At first, I was skeptical of politics, but upon going I was shown how much it can connect to our lived faith.

The first one is the Gun Industry Accountability Act, the second is the Empower Act Accountability Act, and the third is the Affordable Housing Bill. With your prayers, we are hoping these bills will be voted on by their respective delegates and senators. (Pastor Emily and I have fact sheets on the bills for those who want to learn more. Let us know if you would like them.)

One of these bills even connects to our members. Yvette's story reflects why these

bills are important to us. As many of you know Yvette was unable to get custody of her father because of her housing situation. So her father was then taken away from her and given to a caregiver. In this case, she might get help through the Affordable Housing Act, so these bills aren't just something that we look at through a political lens but as a way for us to help those we care about. These are just some of the ways that we can use our gifts to help our neighbor and to help ourselves. Our spirituality isn't just limited to the church building but can be lived to change the world in large and small ways and one of these ways is through advocacy.

One of our scriptures for this series is our famous John 3:16: "for God so loved the WORLD...". That includes you (and your unfortunate neighbor down the street. Sorry.) This season, take a breath and wonder at the ways God's love prepares us to understand the ultimate (and baffling) love of Christ on the cross.

In the ancient church, they took Lent as a time to prepare new members for their baptism and official entrance into the church. You may be a new member, or you may not even remember the first time you stepped into a church. Either way, this is a time for you to re-prepare yourself, to re-understand exactly what brought you to this place and the belovedness God has bestowed on you.

Olney HELP Food Needs

You may leave non-perishable food donations in the box in the Meeting Room behind the Sanctuary or in the marked box in the Community Hall. Items needed most at this time: (updated 2/15/24) **canned fruit (in juice)**, **peanut butter (16 oz, smooth)**, **size** 7 diapers, baked beans and pancake syrup.

Also, canned chili, canned chicken, sloppy joe sauce and canned pasta, canned tomatoes (prefer low salt), adult cereal, spaghetti sauce – plain kind, canned meats, such as tuna, chicken, turkey, corned beef, spam, salmon, Vienna sausage, etc.; 1 lb. bags of rice and rice sides (Knorr/Roni), pasta sides (Knorr/Roni), baked beans, canned green beans, corn, peas (low/no salt), Jelly - all sizes, all flavors, condiments – BBQ sauce, ketchup, mustard, salad dressing; instant mashed potatoes - pouches and boxes, juice boxes for kids - 100% juice, shelf stable bottled juice, frosting for all our cake mixes, and pancake mix.

You can also drop off Giant gift cards at the Giant Customer Service Desk and they will hold them for Olney Help.

ి HYMN 282 'Tis Finished! The Messiah Dies By Charles Wesley

Considered one of the great hymns of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil

1. 'Tis finished! the Messiah dies, cut off for sins, but not his own. Accomplished is the sacrifice, the great redeeming work is done.

2. The veil is rent; in Christ alone the living way to heaven is seen; the middle wall is broken down, and all the world may enter in.

3. 'Tis finished! All my guilt and pain,I want no sacrifice beside;for me, for me the Lamb is slain;'tis finished! I am justified.

4. The reign of sin and death is o'er, and all may live from sin set free; Satan hath lost his mortal power; 'tis swallowed up in victory.

This four-stanza version, written mostly from 1749-51, is commonly seen. He was inspired by John 19:30:

When he had received the drink, Jesus said, "It is finished." With that, he bowed his head and gave up his spirit.

Upon his deathbed, Wesley completed an eight-stanza version. That final stanza ensures that "redeemed sinners" are granted entrance to heaven – a common feature of Wesley's hymns. In 1853, 70 years after Wesley's death, William Bradbury, a Baptist revival composer, wrote the tune "Olive's Brow" for these lyrics.
