To the Salem UMC Community-

Normally for the December newsletter I am writing about getting ready for Jesus, the Advent of his coming again or his coming as a babe in the manger. This year we are still getting ready for him, but our church community will be getting ready for something else as well. We are preparing our hearts to celebrate the ministry of Rev. Janet Craswell at Salem. As was announced in last month's newsletter, our 2014 budget is not able to support two clergy any longer. Janet who is our deacon is hired by Salem and not appointed by the Bishop to a church as an elder is. So it is with sad hearts that we are releasing her to find another meaningful ministry. So I would like to use this forum to share my thoughts about Janet's ministry among us.

As an elder of the UMC I realize that I am one of the few who have had the privilege in sharing the ministry with a deacon. There is about one deacon for every thirty-two elders in the denomination. And it has been such a blessing. Janet has served as Salem's deacon for ten years!

For five of them I have had the privilege to serve with her. When I reflect on our shared experience in serving this congregation, I am reminded of I Corinthians 12. Every one of us has been given different spiritual gifts but we all have the same Spirit of God. These different gifts are all part of the One Body of Jesus. Janet and I have the same Spirit in us, but we are gifted in different ways. Often I was amazed at just how our gifts complimented each other as they came together to serve God's people here at Salem. We served as partners in ministry. We respected our differences as we listened to the other, and then decided how to proceed. And I believe Salem has been blessed by this joint ministry.

I was asked recently if I will be able to minister without Janet here. By the grace of God all of us will continue to minister. Will we miss Janet's presence? Of course, we will! How could we not? Janet's role and mission here at Salem has been to help shape and form us spiritually. We have been recipients of her gifts of creativity, insights, intellect, spiritual depth, passion for justice, and humor. She is leaving us at a different place on our journey of grace than where we were when she began with us ten years ago. And for

that we need to offer our thanks and praise to God. Our journey will not end when she leaves. We will continue to grow in God's grace and knowledge.

As we await the coming of our Lord, we await also the new direction God is leading us at Salem and the new direction in which God will be leading Janet and her ministry.

As publisher of the Salem Newsletter, I was asked to talk to several people regarding their relationship in serving with Janet. Carole Roberts wrote: "If you ask any of the kids who participate in Salem's Youth Group why they attend every week they will usually tell you it's because it's fun. Probe a little deeper and you will hear that it is because Janet makes it so much fun. Whether it is baking cookies for the college students or troops, shopping for food with the money collected on Souper Bowl Sunday, making sure the traditional chocolate muffins are on the menu for Rock, or practicing for musical performances, Janet's upbeat attitude and amazing flexibility keeps our youth thinking and growing and serving throughout the year. She helps the kids tackle big topics like hunger with the 30 Hour Famine and poverty as she tells them about the life of their Compassion International adoptee Felix. She knows how to relate to teens using scenarios, games, and humor. She asks them what they think and encourages them to ask questions of their own. She knows what motivates kids these days whether it is using technology to get her message across, offering donuts between services to reward them getting up early to participate in a service, or hosting semi-annual killer bunny parties. But most of all, she looks for each one's gifts and encourages them to use them to glorify God. We have been so blessed to have her working with our vouth!"

Some others made comments about how the Bible seemed to come alive during our Disciples' classes

and I think Rhonda Barrett wrapped it up just fine: "Janet = words of wisdom wrapped in a hot pink Boa and a tiara." Thank you Janet for sharing your wisdom and love with us for the past 10 very short years. Velma

A LETTER FROM REV. JANET

Dear Salem People,

As you know by now, the position of Minister of Spiritual Formation at Salem has been eliminated from the 2014 budget. My last day at Salem will be December 31, 2013. It has been a blessing and privilege to serve with you these past 10 years. Salem church is part of the Baltimore-Washington Conference of the United Methodist Church. In our conference, clergy may not return to their past churches, except in very rare circumstances when specifically invited by the current pastor. Once I leave Salem, I will be gone. I cannot come back for bazaars or dinners, for retreats or special events. I cannot officiate at weddings or funerals of Salem people, whether those events are held at the church or off-site. I cannot counsel you after December 31. I will hold you in my heart and in my prayers, but I will not be in ministry with you anymore.

Many of you have asked about the limits of the "no return" policy. After all, I will continue to live in Montgomery County and am in contact with many of you on social media. So here are some general guidelines: if you run into me somewhere, please say hi! You don't have to pretend that I'm invisible. We can talk to each other. But I cannot talk to you about anything that is going on at Salem or within the United Methodist

denomination. Likewise, I will not talk with you about spiritual matters -- anything about your faith journey is to be shared with your pastor, not with me. So, for example, we can talk about the weather and our families, we can talk about what my sons are doing and you can show me pictures of your grandkids. But we will not be talking about Salem.

At the end of December, I will be dropping my connections to the Salem Facebook page and the Salem ASP page as well. If I am your Facebook "friend," we can still be in contact, but under the same rules as apply face-to-face: we will not talk about church at all. If I get a job at another church, my Facebook page will likely contain information about the activities at my new appointment. If you prefer not to have that information in your newsfeed, it will not hurt my feelings if you "unfriend" me.

I know these rules may seem harsh, but experience throughout the United Methodist Church has proven that such boundaries are necessary for a healthy church. Salem needs to be able to move forward into the bright future God has planned for you. I need to be able to minister in whatever new way and with whatever new people God brings to me. We all need to be clear that after December 31, I will be your friend, but I can no longer be your pastor, spiritual mentor, counselor, or minister.

The Baltimore-Washington Conference mandates that the following paragraphs be printed verbatim when a clergyperson leaves a church:

Returning to a Previous Appointment.

1. As of the effective date of a new appointment, a pastor shall immediately cease all pastoral counseling and pastoral visitation with members or member families in the previous appointment. Since appointments are generally announced several weeks in advance, each pastor has

adequate time in which to effect closure and make appropriate referral to another for the pastoral care of members.

- 2. Pastors shall have a clear understanding with former congregations that they will not return to officiate at baptisms, weddings, and funerals, or do pastoral counseling or pastoral visitation in that parish. Pastors, active or retired, shall respectfully decline to participate in such duties when invited by members of a former congregation. Declining all such invitations is the responsibility of the previous pastor. The present pastor, at his or her discretion, may invite the previous pastor to return for pastoral functions. However, the present pastor should never be under any pressure to invite the previous pastor.
- 3. Several weeks prior to concluding a pastoral appointment, a pastor shall inform all members of the church of this policy by printing sections 1 and 2 verbatim in either a pastoral letter or a church newsletter to be sent to each member and encourage them to support the policy by their prayers and actions.

What's Next for Salem?

On Sunday, November 17, Christie Latona, Mission Strategist for the Baltimore-Washington Conference, met with Salem's leaders. She discussed ways in which she could lead us through a new visioning process. Anyone interested in helping to set a new direction is welcome to attend. Set the date to begin this process: Saturday, February 8.

NEED A SPECIAL CHRISTMAS GIFT?

What do you give the person who already has everything? Another sweater? Another video game? What about if you gave hope and health to the world instead?

On Sunday, December 1, our Sunday school students will host an alternative giving fair during "Happy Hour" from 9:00-10:00 and during the coffee hour following the 10:00 service. The kids will help "sell" animals and bed nets to anyone who would like to make a contribution to the Heifer Project or Imagine No Malaria, the United Methodist Church's anti-malaria campaign.

The alternative gift fair has gifts for every budget. \$10 will buy an anti-malarial bed net or a share of a sheep. \$75 provides enough medication to treat 15 patients stricken with malaria. For \$250 you can buy a water buffalo that will provide milk and the power to plow a field for a farmer in a developing country. \$30 will buy honeybees; \$60 will buy a trio of rabbits. All the donations to the Heifer Project or Imagine No Malaria include training for the recipient in farming or malaria prevention.

We spend a lot of time trying to teach our children that the real meaning of Christmas can't be bought at the mall. Come live that lesson by giving gifts that bring life and love to the world in the name of Jesus Christ. Please make sure your kids come to the 9:00 Happy Hour on December 1.

UNITED METHODIST COMMITTEE ON RELIEF (UMCOR) IS THERE!



UMCOR – The United Methodist Committee on Relief is already in the Philippines.

In the wake of Typhoon <u>Haiyan</u>, UMCOR is actively mobilizing resources to respond to a series of disasters to hit the Philippines over the past 12 months. Though an accurate casualty toll is TBD, it is clear the destruction is massive.

UMCOR's and <u>UMCOR Philippines</u> initial response will involve distribution of food and water purification tablets. UMCOR expects to provide relief services to at least 1,000 families.

Got Clothing?



<u>January – May 2014 Book Discussion</u> Selections

<u>January 9 – **The Testament of Mary** by Colm</u> Tóibin (fiction)

Shortlisted for the 2013 Man Booker Prize, Colm Tóibín's provocative, haunting, and indelible portrait of Mary presents her as a solitary older woman still seeking to understand the events that become the narrative of the New Testament and the foundation of Christianity.

In the ancient town of Ephesus, Mary lives alone, years after her Son's crucifixion. She has no interest in collaborating with the authors of the Gospel—her keepers, who provide her with food and shelter and visit her regularly. She does not agree that her Son is the Son of God; nor that his death was "worth it;" nor that the "group of misfits he gathered around him, men who could not look a woman in the eye," were holy disciples. Mary judges herself ruthlessly (she did not stay at the foot of the Cross until her Son died—she fled to save herself), and is equally harsh on her judgment of others. This woman who we know from centuries of paintings and scripture as the docile, loving, silent, long-suffering, obedient, worshipful mother of Christ becomes a tragic heroine with the relentless eloquence of Electra or Medea or Antigone. Tóibín's tour de force of imagination and language is a portrait so vivid and convincing that our image of Mary will be forever transformed.

I wish to thank Janet Craswell, Janet Howes; I believe Rose-Eide-Altman and Joann Ranshaw were the last two who got it right. Congratulations to all of you.

Carmen writes of her Mother: "Helen was born & raised in Watsontown, PA (about 16 miles south of Williamsport) in the Susquehanna River valley. Her parents were Bess and Drew Weaver. Bess was the Salutatorian of her class and taught school until she had children, and Drew was a master carpenter and stone mason.

Helen was musically talented and had the lead part in her high school operettas for 3 years in a row. She also liked to hunt and could handle a shotgun quite well to bring down pheasant! At the age of about 22 she moved to Washington, D.C. and got a job with the National Archives, which at the time was located in the Pentagon. She was living on Pennsylvania Avenue about a block from the White House when she met her future husband, Van, a handsome sailor who had just returned to the states after having been in Pearl Harbor during the Japanese attack. It was love at first sight and they were married after knowing each other for only 57days! They only had a short time together before he had to go back to the Pacific and WW2... when he returned 2 years later, he had a daughter! No emailing or texting back then, just letters... and they were censored by the Navy. Many wartime marriages failed, but they have been married now for 71 years! She was a wonderful Navy Wife and always made wherever they lived "home"... and home was many places.

Helen's interests over the years have included oil painting and playing the organ. She was also an accomplished seamstress and an excellent cook! Submitted by: Carmen Harding, her daughter
