To the Salem UM Church Community,

November is finally here. The 2016 presidential election will soon be over. This particular election cycle has been hostile, hateful, and divisive. There is little love for neighbor or for political opponent. Yet both the Hebrew Scriptures and Jesus call us to love our neighbors. No joke! We are called to love, not just the loveable, but our enemies, those who hate us, and even those who persecute us. Impossible? Challenging? Absolutely! But the love of God shown to us in Jesus is greater than any political party's agenda or candidate. We as Christians are to express God's love in all our actions and words, which include our postings on social media. How do we offer love to those who have a strong, yet very different

political stance? Can we love those who have different political views than ours? Jesus did. His love forgave those who were crucifying him. And Jesus still loves each person. Jesus opens the Kingdom of God to all which includes both Republicans and Democrats.

Our allegiance is first to our Sovereign God who created heaven and earth, who offers all humanity forgiveness, love, and eternal life through Jesus Christ, and whose Spirit is always with us.
