Building Spiritual Muscles: Accountable Discipleship; Part 2

Building physical muscles takes discipline. Going to the gym every now and then will not create strong muscles the way consistent training will. We either discipline ourselves to exercise every day or we hire others such as personal trainers or join an exercise class to keep us disciplined. Having an exercise partner helps us stay disciplined, too. All of these hold us accountable for our physical exercise. To build physical muscles takes disciplined exercise.

Have you ever thought about how one builds spiritual muscles? Or how we build the muscles of our faith? What kind of exercises would we need to do to build spiritual muscles?

And are we self-disciplined or do we need others to help keep us accountable. One of the tenets of Methodism is that it is a practical faith. It is not one that is ethereal or otherworldly. We don't worship a God who is out there somewhere and doesn't care about us. Methodism claims a faith that can be practiced every moment of every day. We can apply it to any situation in our lives. But to do this effectively takes awareness and support. Sometimes it is easier to ignore a situation or deal with it in our own way, than to rely on our spiritual muscles. This is where we need discipline to build and maintain our spiritual muscles. Like building physical muscles, some are great with self-discipline, while others need support. Those who need support can become the accountability partners, offering each other support and encouragement.

As your pastor, I would like to offer us a way to do this. For fifteen years I have participated in accountable discipleship groups. These groups helped to form my faith and live it out in my daily life. I grew deeper in my love for God and broader in sharing that love with others. These groups agreed or covenanted to meet weekly for one hour. We as a group decided which aspects of our faith we needed to practice regularly. Then during the week we would practice it on our own. Our weekly group gatherings were our check-in times. We would then report to each other what we were able or not able to practice. When we succeeded, we rejoiced together. When we weren't as successful, we encouraged each other.

The groups that I participated in used these four areas to build our spiritual muscles: Acts of Worship, Devotion, Compassion, and Justice. We wrote clauses for each "Act" according to where we needed accountability. We also wrote some personal clauses of accountability. Here are some examples:

Acts of Worship:

-We will participate in weekly corporate worship, striving for true involvement, even when we are traveling.

-We will pray for those who lead worship each week, especially the preacher.

-We will pray for those who visit our worship service that they will be touched by God's grace.

Acts of Devotion:

-We will practice daily devotions and record any spiritual insights that we gain which we will share in our group.

-We will pray for our enemies.

-We will read materials and watch programs that will enhance our discipleship.

Acts of Compassion:

-When we are aware of a need, we will do all we can to meet that need.

-We will practice listening to other people as a ministry of grace.

-We will set aside time each month to help those in need in our community.

Acts of Justice:

-When we are aware of an injustice practiced in our church, our community, our nation, and the world, we will seek ways to speak out and act on righting this injustice.

-We will participate in being inclusive.

-We will work toward reconciliation whenever possible.

Jesus' ministry was practical. He practiced God's love everywhere he went. John Wesley saw faith as practical as well. He had three rules for his accountability groups: 1) Do no harm; 2) Do good; 3) Stay connected with God. And each of these areas had specific clauses that defined how to practice these rules. We have a faith that can be applied to our daily lives. How well do we practice it on our own? Or could we practice it more effectively if we did it together?

Each sermon in the Easter season, I will highlight one of these ministry areas. Then following the worship services on Sunday, May 21, I invite anyone who is interested in participating in a group to stay for an orientation. If you cannot be there May 21, but are interested in knowing more, contact me.

I am praying that we at Salem can grow deeper in our faith as we reach further and wider into our community with God's grace.

FROM THE CONGREGATION

This location for the month of May is being dedicated to Jacob Savage. I know many of our readers are not in "town" and are not familiar with "our" Savage Twins. We at Salem have waited and prayed along with Debbie and Brandon. Mathew is fine but his twin is very sick and in need of a liver transplant in able to survive. The following story will introduce you to the family but first let's talk about the upcoming fundraiser:

Fundraiser for Jacob Savage: One-year old Jacob Savage is in need of a liver transplant. Funds are being raised through the Children's Organ Transplant Association. Donations can be made directly to COTA (cota.org) to his account at and/or support a fundraiser at Green Turtle on Thursday, May 18. Coupons are needed for Green Turtle and can be found on the back page of this newsletter. Invite and share the coupons with friends and neighbors. In a blog Debbie set up to keep people informed, she wrote Thanksgiving 2016 (quoting):



A year ago at Thanksgiving we had just found out that we were expecting twins, and high-risk momo twins at that. We announced the pregnancy to family on Thanksgiving Day, but the fear that the momo status would keep us from meeting our twins was crippling.

This year at Thanksgiving we are faced with the harsh reality that our son Jacob needs a liver transplant to survive. We spent Tuesday at Georgetown University Hospital meeting with the transplant team who will get him listed and work with us to save our boy's life.

It has been quite a year with such extreme challenges: a momo pregnancy and inpatient stay, losing my father to cancer while I was on bedrest, the NICU stay for both of our boys, transitioning to being parents of twins, unpaid maternity leave, 7 months of seeking a diagnosis for Jacob's jaundice and liver disease, and several hospitalizations. Through all things, we are thankful for the blessings that have been in our lives through it all: the kindness of family, our church, incredible support we received for our gofundme campaign, top notch hospitals near our home, our amazing au pair, the joy that capturing two boys smiling at once brings. Just yesterday, someone from church dropped off a Christmas wreath to help us celebrate the holiday season

despite the stress in our lives. And on Wednesday, a package arrived with Christmas stockings picked out for each member of our family and one for our an pair as well. There is such beauty in the way that friends support each other in hard times.

This holiday season, we are thankful for family and for our hope in God who has carried us through the hardest year of our lives. From our family to yours, happy Thanksgiving.

Since this post, Jacob has been in and out of hospitals, on two transplant lists and literally fighting for his life.

The following picture was posted on the blog this week with the following post: Jacob is still in the



hospital. He's having some issues breathing and is on oxygen to help with that. He's hanging in there, but the bottom line is they're just trying to keep him stable as we wait for his miracle. We were able to visit him for a few hours both Saturday and Sunday with Matthew, and it was really nice to have a chance for the whole family to be together. Our "normal" routine is for one parent to visit Jacob one night after work while the other one takes care of Matthew at home, and then we switch the next day. We kept Matthew occupied by visiting the fish tanks on the floor. The hospital wing Jacob is in has an ocean theme.

Yesterday, we were also able to take a trip to the National Arboretum for a picnic and to see the azaleas blooming. We had a nice time, but we were sure missing Jacob!


High-School:
