

To the Salem UM Church Community-

Where has this year gone? It's Christmas again! We are already busy trying to create Christmas memories with the buying of gifts, baking cookies, decorating our homes, throwing parties, attending concerts, and gathering as a family. Every day seems to be packed with something that needs to be done before December 25. Christmastime can be filled with worry, stress, and even dread. Many hate Christmas because of all its expectations. In the midst of busyness and anxiousness, we forget that this is the season of Advent. Huh? Advent? Isn't it a time to prepare for Christmas? Advent is just the four Sundays before Christmas when we light that big wreath with four candles? Yes, it is, but Advent is much more than these.

Advent is a holy time in which we prepare ourselves for the coming of Christ. During Advent we are reminded again that we worship a God who loved the world so much God became one of us. God in the form of Jesus lived among us to teach us by his life, death, and resurrection the depth of divine love for humanity. God became Emmanuel, God with us. First, he was born into poverty. Then to protect him, his parents became refugees by fleeing to a foreign land. As an adult, Jesus reached out to the outcasts and sinners, made friends with both men and women, and taught both the influential and those outside his faith. Later he was arrested, tortured, abandoned by those closest to him, humiliated, and was executed to save the world. We endure the self-created stress and forget the One for whom this season has been created and the purpose of his coming.

This Advent would you covenant with me to slow down, create a less stressful December, and focus on the wonder of the coming of the Christ Child into the world? Ponder how his birth has created hope in the world for over two millenniums and how it is still creating hope. Advent is a time to be intentional with our worship God, prayer, reading the scriptures so our eyes, ears, hearts and minds can be open to new ways to love God and to serve others as we share this hope. Advent is a time to wait and prepare for the coming of Emmanuel, God with us. Advent is also a time to show the world how to live like God is with us.

As you slow down this Advent, take time each week to read the scriptures listed below before Sunday's worship. As you read them, ask yourself, "How do they illustrate the coming of Emmanuel, God with us?" Also, I invite you to obtain a book online called *Advent: God is With Us* by Robin Wilson and read the chapter designated for each week in Advent as you prepare to worship on Sunday mornings. Practicing Advent might just be the salve we need to calm our anxious, stressed souls and live with hope. After all, God is with us!



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SOMETHING HAPPENING AT SALEM



On Tuesday, November 5, Salem proudly hosted Anthony Cohen, a local resident, who has devoted his life to researching the history of the Underground Railroad in Montgomery County. Tony shared how when he was an intern for the Historical Society, he asked if they had any info on the Underground Railroad. He was told that the Underground Railroad didn't exist. Tony perseveredqq to retrieve information about it. He found enough information to write his graduation thesis which was later published. His research included interviews with locals as well as newspaper clippings that gave information about runaway slaves. He found out that Montgomery County played an important role in the Underground Railroad. It was a hub of stations helping slaves escape to the north and beyond into Canada.

In 1996 he decided he would take the trip the ancestors did to escape freedom and recreate the trip as best he could. This included being shipped in a wooden box for a day. In total he traveled 1200 miles from Sandy Spring to Ontario, Canada by foot, boat, and train. It took him two months.

Tony talked about being on the Oprah Winfrey show where he shared his knowledge of the struggles the escaped slaves encountered and the assistance they were given along the way. He also shared how he trained Oprah for her part in the movie, Beloved, right here in Sandy Spring.

In addition to being an expert on the Underground Railroad, Tony began The Menare Foundation, a nonprofit organization dedicated to the preservation of Underground Railroad history, historic sites and the creation of educational programs. One of these projects is the Button Farm, a living history center which sits on 40 acres inside Seneca Creek State Park in Germantown. This is a working farm which

depicts a 19th slavery plantation. It is open to visitors from spring through fall.

Tony's passion for this important part of our history was very evident in his breadth and depth of knowledge. Thank you, Tony, for your brilliant and heart-felt presentation.
