Hello, church!

I still cannot believe my blessing to be here. Over the past 100 days, I have:

- Gotten to know some of you
- Preached 12 sermon
- Taught 7 classes
- Attended prayer and covenant small groups
- Sat down to meetings with the Leadership Team
- Helped with a yard sale

- Met community members (and many community dogs!)
- Gone on a walk almost every morning
- Completed my ordination papers
- and more!

This list is a snapshot of the blessing that is my life here.

Thank you.

Through all these experiences, I have been watching, listening, asking questions to learn who you are, who Salem is, and where God is present with us here. This is, as we discussed in July, learning about our "soil." I expect (hope!) to continue learning about you for years to come. As I'm learning, I'll share my reflections with you. I pray that if I'm making wrong assumptions, that you'll tell me! Let's talk about it. Where did the idea come from? What makes it wrong? Or, perhaps, I'll learn something as an outsider that will help you to name something you've been thinking about for years. This is a partnership and a process for us to engage in together.

Here's a snippet of what I've learned. You are a church that cares deeply about mission and commitment. When needs are expressed, you meet them faithfully and quickly. That's amazing! Our prayer group is so faithful that they pray for people they haven't had updates on in months. Our Prayer Shawl ministry has been crocheting longer than they remember. Our Covenant Disciple group is committed to learning, trying new things, and connecting with God and each other. People who attend church have been faithful in their "God Jobs" and COVID precautions. Our Leadership Team is faithful in their stewardship of the church. They care about the members, about how we use our money, how we care for our building, and mostly, about serving as Christians.

Because I have now been here 100 days, let's talk about direction. Some folks have asked about starting new ministries or new missions. This is admirable and lovely. I love the passion! However, the biggest need I see at this church right now is for Sabbath rest. Sabbath rest is a little different than just resting. Sabbath rest is taking time to release the world to worship and be fed by God. This can be rest, like sleeping in or having an all-day pajama day. However, it can also be hiking and enjoying God's creation. It can be buying ingredients from the farmers market based on what looks the most beautiful, then preparing a lovely meal for your community. It can mean going to church and really, *really* letting go of life to rest in awe at God's presence. This is how we fill our souls and live our lives in "overflow."



That's part of the promise of the Gospel. That's what leads us to become Christian: the promise that *there is something more*! Something wonderful and life-changing filled with grace, forgiveness, and hope. The church can be a place where we start to taste the Kingdom of God.

That's what I want us to do. One hundred days in, and all I can think is that I want to see you all enjoying Sabbath rest. I want Salem to be a place where you can let go of chaos and be filled. This is why we open worship with our body prayer, and it's why I'm asking you to do God Jobs for worship.

Does it sound counterintuitive? Perhaps. You understand the body prayer (home meditation below!) we have been working to hold our stress in church and then intentionally let it go. We do this three times because it is so hard. But how are God Jobs related to Sabbath rest? It's still called a *job*. God Jobs are part of Sabbath rest because serving others, knowing you are contributing, and that you are part of something important feeds our souls. God Salem News October 2020 Jobs make church happen. This is helping with contact tracing, laying down cones for social distancing, setting up the internet wire, setting up the altar and sound system. Claiming a service role could change your entire worship experience. Knowing you did something necessary may illuminate the scripture in an incredible way. When we live into this, we start to see the way it plays out in our lives and communitiesmore than just on Sunday morning! Who doesn't get rest? Who isn't given time for true enjoyment of God's world?



Worshipful Rest @Home

Worship should be a time to bring your worries and stressors to let them go. I want you to bring everything that bothers you and weighs you down, and I want you to encounter it in worship in a way that helps you to release it (even for just a moment!). This is what we're doing in our call to worship. The full meditation is below if you'd like to try it at home. We've done that three times in a row every Sunday. I don't know about you, but once we're finished symbolically and physically releasing these stressors, I am much more ready for worship. Then, when we move on into worship, I am ready. I can actually rest in God's presence.

If you want to do this at home, here are the steps laid out. The image is also on our website.



This doesn't mean God will take over all your cares or change your life. This is preparation for being with God. This is a physical prayer that God would help you to release the things that are hurting you. My prayer is that this will help you to rest in God's presence so that you can feel genuinely renewed.

God Jobs

My prayer is that many hands and well-established boundaries will lead to deeper worship.

Let's also be practical. We need more than one person to know how to do each thing that we value. Since arriving here, I've learned that sound quality is critical. Perhaps it's the same at every hearing church (we certainly didn't worry about it in the Deaf church!). At this point, I believe we need at least three more people to learn to run and set up the sound technology. If we have 4-5 people, it will be easier for each to take a break because you are not the only one responsible. Chris Hart and Nancy Wilkie have done the "heavy lifting" to figure out how the new outdoor system works. Soon they will be able to set it up like a "paint by number" so that anyone willing can learn. However, we are moving inside soon, and that system is even easier. National Drug Take-Back Day

October 24th, from 10:00 A.M. to 2:00 P.M., is National Prescription Drug Take-Back Day. It will allow you to dispose of your unused or out-of-date drugs safely. Most important, it will prevent them from being misused. The 2018 National Survey on Drug Use and Health found that 9.9 million Americans misused controlled prescription drugs and most of them obtained the drugs from family or friends from the home medicine cabinet.

In the Brookeville area, there are 5 locations within 10 miles; all of them start with
