Beloved:

Mary probably didn't hear the choir of angels. On that first Christmas night in Bethlehem, it would have been chilly, there would have been pain mixed with tears after giving birth, alone in a strange place, as a teenage girl with a man she barely knew, separated from all she loved -- she probably didn't hear the angels.

Joseph probably didn't see the star that night. Traveling on foot for days with a young woman who carried a child that was not his own, kneeling next to her while the barn animals looked on and the baby was born, envisioning all that might lie ahead for a simple carpenter -- he probably didn't see the star.

But there were angels, and there was a star that lit up the sky. Our story tells us so. This year, we

are living through a Christmas like no other. It is probably closer to the original Christmas than those of past years. We might not be hearing choirs of angels or seeing the star of Bethlehem. But the story is still real -- very real. And, the story is still God-anointed. Amid the pain, uncertainty, loneliness, and unfamiliar things that mark this Christmas amid twin pandemics, the miracle still unfolds.

That is one of the joys of Christmas -- each year, the Christ child is born anew into our lives and into the world. We celebrate an ancient story, but as people of faith, we also rejoice in the coming of a savior, the Prince of Peace, who comes bearing the gift of unconditional love. It is both ancient and new every year.

This Christmas, I pray that the spirit of Emmanuel -- God with us -- fills your life. I pray that God will once again break into history and hold you and all those you love in God's embrace. I pray you will share God's love with those around you in acts of mercy and justice. And, I pray that you will hear -- however distant -- the singing of the angels' alleluias and experience the light of God's glory illuminating the year ahead.

BLUE CHRISTMAS OR

THE LONGEST NIGHT SERVICE



As with most of our services in 2020, our Blue Christmas was broadcast on-line at SalemUMC.live, YouTube, and Facebook (isn't Technology wonderful!). We are not allowed to meet in our building, but we can still worship our God together. On Sunday mornings we gather on Zoom and can still communicate before and after service. If we don't prefer Zoom, we can use SalemUMC.live on our own instead! Thank God for once again providing worship time together.

Rev. Emily chose 4-candles. I am covering her comments below:

- Preparation Clear our minds, our thoughts, and our hearts to receive God and what He has for us, His message to "me"; that message could be different than anyone else's – listen for it.
- 2. Proclamation This part of the message is where the candles are lit:
 - a. Candle #1 We light this candle for the loved ones we have lost this year. Salem has lost quite a few, I can count 10; there could be more; enough to send us in dark despair if we let it.
 - b. Candle #2 For the results of COVID-19, Loss of Jobs, in some cases loss of homes, actually this category could be endless, so many things to lead us into darkness.
 - c. Candle #3 We have lost our direction; we ask ourselves, "Where do we go from here?" or "What next?" Rev. Emily chose Isaiah 40:1; 28-31. Please take a moment to read this scripture; it is full of what candle 4 is all about!

d. Candle #4 – Is a very important candle as it stands for HOPE! As long as we have hope we can make it through any crises. In one of Jesus Parables, He likened us to a candle put under a bushel where it gave no light. We are that candle; we must let our light shine to guide the world to Christ. When we are at our lowest, we can, with Gods help, keep our candle trimmed and burning bright

No one said it would be easy, and this is where our Brothers and Sisters in Christ come into play, an encouraging word, a prayer (or two) a smile, a plate of cookies – yes, all this will bring the HOPE and help trim that candle, so it burns bright again. BLUE CHRISTMAS? Yes, but it doesn't have to put out our light.

CHRISTMAS EVE TRADITIONAL CANDLE LIGHT WORSHIP SERVICE

CHRIST OUR BREAKTHROUGH

As you are all very aware, in-house worship is not possible. With the knowledge God has given humans, we were able to use HIS breakthrough to worship TOGETHER through our computers; the joy we share knowing at any time, day or night, when we need to hear our favorite sermon, it's there! Rev. Emily provided us with much "food for thought" in our "traditional" Candlelight service. I will confess once I finally found it, I watched it three times before I went to bed, and again Christmas morning before I sat down to write this article.

Using the Advent Wreath, Rev. Emily walked us through (as we call it) the Christmas Story. (Think about that – the Christmas story - I will leave that thought with you because it's more than a babe in a manger, shepherds being sung to by a choir of angels, or wise men traveling thousands of miles to follow a star, we each have our own [Christ[mas] story.)

Our first candle on the wreath is HOPE! Hope we find the perfect job; hope I would pass that math exam; hope I get that new computer for Christmas. Hope! Where would we be without HOPE! The scripture reading was Luke 2:1-7. This scripture tells us about Jesus' birth and the shepherds coming to the manger. OK, let's put this in the 21st century. Women, you find you are close to your due date, and you have to make an emergency trip. You and your husband are on a dark lonely road, Say Death Valley - nothing around, and you go into labor. Men, you will have to deliver this child – shall I guess you are feeling a bit of panic? So, birth takes place successfully, but you didn't bring anything for the baby! You search the trunk of the car, find rags you keep for emergencies, wrap the baby in them, and make a

bed for him in an old laundry basket you keep in the car to store things. *Is this hope?*

You haven't had time to settle down when all at once cars start appearing, and men start piling out of their cars, shouting, "where's the baby!" You panic! What are you talking about? you ask. When they tell you angels appeared to them, you think they are crazy. Stop reading a moment and think about a 21st century version of the conception and birth of Jesus. How would your story read? *Oh, I could write a 21st century version of "The Christmas story", but not now! I'll let you finish this part of the story and bring out your HOPE.* And Dr. Harry singing "Away in a Manger" was the perfect song!

The second Advent candle is PEACE. The scripture is Luke 2:8-12. PEACE? What is peace? What does that word mean to you? No more war, our sons and daughters coming home from faraway countries. OK, I just received a message from far away; I am trying to find a way to describe peace. I stop, open the message, and found no words, just a picture of a metal snowflake hanging on a Christmas tree. "Thank you, Lord! Peace is sitting in the window watching snow fall, no noise to distract you, nothing between you and God as you watch the gift God has given you, the beautiful SNOW! You remember the scripture where He promised He would wash us whiter than snow, and you find that PERFECT peace!

Our third Advent candle is LOVE. Oh, we know that word-red hearts, candy and roses, engagement rings, and marriage vows, holding your baby for the first time. I could go on and on... you get the picture! "For God so LOVED the world that HE GAVE his only begotten son!" Would you? Don't even try to answer that, not even to yourself. God puts people in our lives for a time or a reason; some become good friends or even your mate, some are thorns in our side! However, OUR JOB is to love them, really love them. You may get the "being used" feeling – believe me – you are! Being used to bring the love OR RECEIVING the love they/you so desperately need.

The last of the candles is JOY. JOY! The best way for me to explain Joy is in song. Read these

words from "He Touched Me" ("Shackled by a heavy burden"); by Bill and Gloria Gaither *The United Methodist Hymnal*, 367

> Shackled by a heavy burden, 'Neath a load of guilt and shame. Then the hand of Jesus touched me, And now I am no longer the same.

He touched me, Oh He touched me, And oh the joy that floods my soul! Something happened and now I know, He touched me and made me whole.

Since I met this blessed Savior, Since He cleansed and made me whole, I will never cease to praise Him, I'll shout it while eternity rolls.

Now in these 4-candles where do you see God's breakthrough? It's fun to try to figure out how to solve other people's problems and wish you had the money to help everyone in need, but have you looked in the mirror recently and asked yourself, "where and when has God given me a breakthrough?"

I've written enough; God says, "wrap it up," so, wrap it up I will with these words. Think about the times you were at a breaking point, and all at once, the answer came; or something happened unexpectedly – not by chance? Rev. Emily said, "write it down." Velma says, "Got a problem? Write God a letter, tell him all about it, how you feel, and ask for His help and Guidance. The answer might not come in tomorrow's mail, but it will come."
