A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR

Happy February!

Have you ever wondered how I choose the scriptures to preach on for Sunday mornings (and why I pick ones I don't like so often)?

Sometimes I choose them thematically, but more often I follow something called a "Lectionary." There are two popular lectionary resources. One is called the Revised Common Lectionary (RCL), and the other is called the Narrative Lectionary (NL). Lectionary committees want to choose enough scripture that if you never read the Bible on your own you would still hear all the high points within a few years in church. The RCL has a 3-year cycle and four readings each week and the NL has a 4-year cycle with one reading each week.

For the New Year, we are following the Narrative Lectionary. In the fall, it follows the big stories in the Old Testament. Around Christmas it switches to reading through a Gospel. I like the narrative lectionary a lot because, as the name suggests, it follows the narrative of God's story with us.

Year One of the Narrative Lectionary is all about the book of Matthew, so you'll hear a lot of that on Sunday mornings!

Some pastors choose to find their own scriptures and themes, rather than following a lectionary. I do that occasionally. However, I know that I have favorite parts of scripture

and if it were only up to me, that's all we would read. You would be fed a diet of Rev. Emily's Top 5 and we would inevitably miss something important. And, actually, I love to wrestle with scriptures I don't like. I love reading something, feeling unsettled, and then digging into it and seeing what God has done. In the past few years my best sermons have been about scriptures I didn't like.

So, I'll keep using lectionary resources. I'll keep letting God speak through these guided readings. I'll keep wondering why God is doing what God is doing. And I'll keep sharing it with all of you.

Olney HELP Food Needs

Updated 12/14/22. You may leave non-perishable food donations in the box in the Meeting Room behind the Sanctuary or in the marked box in the Community Hall. Food items needed most at this time: Canned meats, such as tuna, chicken, turkey, corned beef, spam, salmon, Vienna sausage, etc.; Hamburger Helper, sloppy joe sauce, condensed soups - tomato, chicken noodle, vegetable, cream of mushroom, cream of chicken; canned chili, canned pasta, plain spaghetti sauce, boxed spaghetti and pasta, 1 lb. bags of rice and rice sides (Knorr/Roni), pancake mix/syrup, dessert mixes - cake, cookie, brownie. Cold cereal, baked beans, canned green beans, corn, peas (low/no salt), Canned fruit in juice, Jelly - all sizes, all flavors, condiments - BBQ sauce, ketchup, mustard, salad dressing; peanut butter (smooth) - 16-18 oz. jars, instant mashed potatoes - pouches and boxes, juice boxes - 100% juice, shelf stable bottled juice. READING ROOM

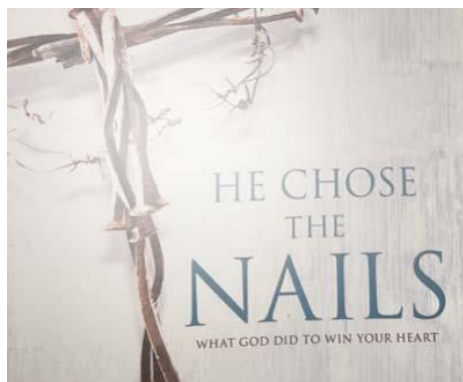
Welcome to the Reading Room upstairs in the Community Hall where you'll be able to read or borrow books, study guides, and
